IV. Approval of minutes from last meeting

Minutes from January 23, 2019 meeting circulated prior to meeting. Teena Kasha moved minutes adopted as circulated. Wendy Weiss seconded. All in favour. Motion carried.

V. **Correspondence** – Letter from Mr. Brandt was received to thank School Council for all the wonderful Teacher Appreciation Week treats.

#### VI. Reports

- a) Financial Shaunet Petiot
  - (i) Profit and Loss report through February 27 presented. Current balance is \$14,332 including ~ \$6,500 in prepaid hot lunches.

- (ii) In follow-up to noted loss in milk program: One milk order didn't arrive but it was paid for. Kerri Auburn-Bovencamp will follow up with milk delivery service.
- (iii) Hot lunch is on track to make donation to field trips, with some extra money. All hot lunch items are making money, especially Subway and hot dogs.
  Shaunet Petiot moved report as presented. Adrian Ketchmark seconded. All in favour. Motion carried.
- b) **Principal** (Jerrit Brandt)
  - i. School Generated Funds (SGA) Presented SGF as of February 27, 2019
  - BRSD Planning Day Mr. Brandt, Kirby Schmidt-Teigan, and 2 SAVVY students attended. Mr. Brandt reported: Schools funded by population, decking trend. Flagstaff hit hardest in Division. Reports from each Department. There are grants for rural busing. School Council (parents) met with some Division Board members separately, as well.
  - iii. Staffing Process for 2019-20 school year On March 5, the Principal and Vice Principal will present case for next year's staffing to Division, which includes projected numbers which are stable for Daysland. There will likely be a Grade 2/3 split again. Because of the many science courses available in high school, numbers in each class have been impacted.
  - iv. Learning Commons Working to build up Learning Commons (Library) and have newly acquired Lego and a large screen TV (for use for student presentations with Chrome Books).
    Looking for old electronics to disassemble.
  - v. Staffing update Mrs. Schlaut and Mrs. Thomas have worked with BRSD to ensure appropriate supports are in place for the Grade 2/3 class. As a result, Inclusive Education has provided additional supports in terms of personnel. A full time Educational Assistant (graduate from Red Deer College program), Hanna Snider, will start Monday, March 4.
  - vi. Congratulations to current EAs who have now all completed EA program from RDC.
  - vii. Report Cards issued March 18 for Elementary and April 15 for Jr/Sr High. April 17 will be interviews, which are student-lead for elementary.
- c) **Hot Lunch** Candice Guhle reports all is well.
- d) **Teacher Appreciation Week** Adrian Ketchmark reports all went well with the week's events. Cost likely around \$250, same as last year. Could have used a couple more volunteers for supervision on the day sit-down meal was given to teachers.
- e) Room Reps:

**Kindergarten (submitted by Laura Zwack):** From Mrs. Teigan - Man in Your Life Night, Grandparent Soup Day, & Mom's Night were all well attended and well received. The students enjoyed having special guests step into their Kindergarten world. We're excited to be going skating twice this upcoming month and have been busy gathering evidence of student learning for our upcoming report cards.

**Grade 1 (Wendy Weiss):** From Ms. Mowat - LA: working on writing skills with a report about winter and create a PowerPoint document. Math: Addition to 12 and will start subtraction to 12 soon. Science: wrap up winter discussion and start "Building Things" unit. Students will be asked to build different structures based on fairy tales. Social: group projects on problem solving, tying into being a good citizen and taking part in our community. We celebrated 100 Day today (it was actually on Monday but we had to improvise because of the snow days). Some activities of the day included; making 100 Day hats, making fruit loop necklaces, writing about what we would do if we were 100 years old (I also took their picture with an aging app) and exploring 100 building materials such as popsicle sticks, snap cubes, pipe cleaners, and dominoes. The students really enjoyed their day! The only other news to share is that we are going skating on Friday afternoon as well as on March 15, which they are very excited about! :)

**Grade 2/3 (Kirby Schmidt-Teigan):** From Mrs. Schlaut - All is going well. Students are building different types of bridges in Science and writing Narrative stories in Language Arts. We will be going skating on March 1st and March 15th. We have been adding and subtracting 2- and 3-digit numbers and developing our mental math strategies. We have been working hard but have been taking brain and breathing breaks throughout the day to help us feel relaxed and ready to learn. We are also participating in a few different mental health programs which will help us learn and practice good sportsmanship and how to handle arguments with friends. Lots of fun learning opportunities going on at school. Our new EA starts soon.

**Grade 4 (submitted by Janelle Hrdlicka):** ELA - We are reading the novel *Hana's Suitcase*. Science - We have started the unit Wheels and Levers - **students might be asked to bring in building supplies in the future (to build cars).** Math - We will be telling time - students should practice reading analog clocks!

**Grade 5 (Adrian Ketchmark):** The grade fives are ready for the cold to go!!! We have been learning about separating solids from solids in Science, and in Social Studies, Indigenous peoples and the Canadian timeline. Language arts we

are reading the novel *Hatchet*, and Phys. Ed we are doing basketball to go along with the Mini Dunkers season. Music we are learning to play the recorder. We have a new student in our class too!!! We will be finishing basketball in March and are looking forward to the ski trip!!

**Grade 6 (submitted by Jeanni Hoermann):** Ms. Pederson - *This month, The Grade 6's have been* finishing up their story writing unit with the focus on editing their word and to make better work choices for meaning. This is preparing for the PAT in May, with our next unit being writing a newspaper article. *They have* been working on the *sky science unit,* with the Grade 6's learning a lot about the moon phases and the planets in our solar system. That will be wrapping up soon, looking at different space technology. We will be starting our next unit of aerodynamics filled with fun experiments. *The Grade 6's have also* finished learning about direct democracy in *Ancient Athens,* which concluded with our Greek Day last week. It was filled with food, writing in Greek, dancing, and pottery designing. Next, we are learning about the Iroquois Confederacy and their matriarchal democracy. *In Math* we have been working on ratios and converting between *fractions, ratios and percent.* In art, the students are creating an agamograph, which is when there are 2 different pictures you can see depending on the angle.

**Grade 7/8 (Candice Guhle):** All is well. Girls basketball hosted Regionals on the weekend.

Grade 9 (Teena Kasha): Mr. Johnson (Science) - We should be finishing up out unit on Environmental Chemistry very soon, within the next few weeks, and we will start Electricity right away. We have a unit exam coming up, most likely just before spring break. Because of the missed days this week, I posted 2 videos online for the students, to watch and take notes on. Mrs. Johnson (LA) – Google Classrooms have been used during no bus days. I would just remind students that when they are absent, they need to be sure they are getting, and completing their homework! Mrs. Thomas (Social): Student teacher is working with students until the end of April. We also have several Grade 9s involved in dinner theatre. Grade 10 (submitted by Jeanni Hoermann): Mr. Johnson: In Science 10, we are finishing up our first unit next week. They have a group project that they will be working on in class, and a report to complete. I am trying a new approach because of the number of snow days we have had this year already, which is to post videos of the content online early for the students as homework, then go over it quickly in class. This hopefully will give students a better understanding of the material, and will help us complete the course on time. Mr. Brandt: I teach a handful of grade 10s in Math 20-3. We started with a focus on graphical representations using data from the students in our elementary. We have now moved into surface area, capacity and volume. We will add a component of scaled drawings and work towards budgeting costs to build a structure. Miss. Johnson: Basketball is wrapping up and Badminton practices will be starting. More information to follow! Mrs. Zimmer: I don't have anything fancy to report except that they are generally doing very well in English class and those of us who are going on the trip to Europe at the end of the month are sure looking forward to it! Mrs. Vikse: I am the new Home Ec. teacher. I only teach the 10s Home Ec. so they are all working in groups to complete their models. They then cook 4 recipes. They are creating a recipe portfolio. I evaluate 2 of their recipes. And there is a test at the end of each module. Each module is worth 1 credit.

- a) BRSD Collaboration Day addressed in principal's report.
  - b) School catchment areas Alison prepared and circulated a draft letter to Division requesting reassessment of catchment areas for Daysland and Bawlf Schools since lower elementary grades are large in Bawlf and small in Daysland. Discussion occurred around information from BRSD Collaboration Day that Kirby attended:
    - Board passed a motion to review our structure, starting with a ward review
    - We've been in existence for 24 years and this type of review has never been done
    - It's time to ask the question "is our structure still serving us well?"
    - Did you know we are a "regional division" not a "school division"?
    - A "regional division" is: a series of specific areas combined together to provide education services within a set border. Our school division was formed from the regions of Beaver County, Camrose County, Flagstaff County and the City of Camrose. As a "regional division" we are required to adhere to those regions. Even our legal name is Battle River Regional Division. We had to create an operating name (Battle River School Division) so people would even understand what our work is!
    - A "school division" is: an area in which provides education services, with greater flexibility for making their own decisions about how the service is structured.
    - In order to conduct a proper review and take any actions we might realize are necessary (or our communities might tell us are necessary) we need to become a "school division".
    - Changing to a school division is a multi-step government process, which requires public consultation, so watch for surveys, meetings, etc. to start later this spring.
    - We will keep you updated as we know more definite details. We will likely have more to share at the spring meeting. And Diane may also contact you by email to invite your feedback.
    - Plan: Feedback on the letter requested from those present and it will still be mailed to Division Office.

#### VIII. New business

- a) Next Daysland School Council meeting date Agreement that next meeting will be April 10, 2019 since 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday in March lands during Spring Break, which is halfway between February meeting and the regular scheduled day for May.


