## COVID Hazard Control Administrative Procedure

BRSD recently communicated that a new Administrative Procedure - 451 COVID Hazard Control is being implemented. This stipulates that all BRSD staff and contractors, as well as all visitors to School Buildings (including parents, coaches, trustees, outside user groups), must provide Proof of Partial Immunization by October 29, 2021, and Proof of Full Immunization no later than December 3, 2021 or negative Rapid COVID-19 Test dated 72 hours or less prior and Proof of a Negative PCR/Antigen Test. We are still open for visitors but if you do plan to visit the school by appointment, please be aware that you will have to show either of these two options prior to entering the building. A letter providing more information on how this impacts school sports will be sent home to athletes in the near future.

We have a new vet center up in the loft this month and we'll be making Witches Brew this month where students have to fill custom orders of witches brew. In Math students continue to focus on addition to 10! Students are learning new math games such as race to 100, war and pop it addition.

In Science we are focusing on creating colour! Students mixed primary colours to make secondary colours. We did this through mixing food colouring into our pudding cups. We made pumpkin, witch and monster coloured cups. It was both yummy and educational!

This group has had an amazing transition into Grade 1. We have lots of fun learning adventures ahead of us this year!

Things are going well in grade 3. In ELA we are working on adding descriptive words into our writing to make it more interesting for our readers. In math we are skip counting numbers up to 1000. In science we are wrapping up our unit on rocks and minerals. We've had fun doing lots of hands on learning within that unit.

Both Mrs. Teigen and her students have really added to their knowledge about rocks and will likely never look at them the same way again!

#### Grade 4/5 (Alison): - Mr. Gratrix

We have been reading a book called "Crime Biters" in ELA that the students have really enjoyed. Students recently made Kahoot! games to learn more about the different physical regions for Social Studies. In Science we are continuing our weather unit and are looking at different types of clouds. In math we have been working on multiplication tables (4/5) and division tables (5).

#### Grade 6 (Wendy): Mrs. McKay

Some fun things we've done in gr. 6:

- Mrs. McKay challenged the class to read 40 books by the end of the year. Everyone is busy trying to get a good start on that.
- Oct. 6: We made bannock and learned a little about indigenous culture with Mrs. McKay's mother-in-law, Alida McKay
- Oct. 12: We had the town CAO in as a guest speaker to talk about municipal government and the election
- Oct. 18: We had naan bread, tea, and dried apricots: a meal Afghanistans often eat, as described in our class novel, The Breadwinner.

#### Grade 7 (Cristin):

The Grade 7 class says they've been learning! We are into a new novel that we are listening to together as a class, adding and subtracting whole numbers and fractions in Math, learning about the first Europeans to arrive in Canada - the French! - and just moved past ecosystems in Science.

#### Grade 8 (Adrian):

The Grade 8's have had a busy start to the year! In social studies we have been learning about the European Renaissance with Mr. Pastachack, and in Science class we have learned about matter with Mrs. Zimmer. Our class has been participating in cross country, golf, and volleyball; and our Jr Girls volleyball team won their tournament this past weekend. Mrs. Thomas in Home Ec. is teaching us how to sew.

#### Grade 9 (Jeannie):

Mrs. V. Zimmer, ELA: We are just wrapping up the first act of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, and the general consensus is, and I quote: "It's not as bad as I thought it would be!";)

Mrs. Johnson, Outdoor ED: Students have been in their Biking and Fire Building unit, which will culminate in a 50 km Bike Trip tomorrow!

Mrs. M. Zimmer: We finished our first unit last week, about biological diversity. A printout with an updated mark will be sent home with the class for science at some point near the end of the week of Oct.18th. I am just waiting for one more student to write the test. Parents should expect to see this by the week of Oct. 25th. They can email me if they have not received it early next week.

We are on our second unit about space! Things are going well. ⊙□

#### Talk to your kids about alcohol

While the legal age to consume alcohol is 18, the average age adolescents in Alberta have their first drink of alcohol that is more than a sip, is 13. This is important because the earlier in life a person starts to drink, the greater the risk of drinking problems in the future.

You can have a positive impact by having open conversations with your child, setting healthy boundaries and clear expectations.

Children lend to mimic the behavior of those they love and admire, especially that of their

#### Refusal Skills

Practice strategies with your child so they feel comfortable saying no when they are offered alcohol or other substances:

"No thanks, I don't want to". Teach them to repeat as many times as needed when being pressured; simply repeat in a friendly, neutral manner. "Sorry, I have to leave". This may be the

best way to get out of a tricky situation. Let your children know they can always say no to something that makes them uncomfortable. This will relieve them of a

### How to have a conversation about alcohol

Be brief and neutral when explaining the facts about alcohol to your child, discuss the pros and cons. Explain the difference between drinking in moderation and alcohol

Encourage questions and expect that you'll be asked about your own drinking and experiences. Listen with full attention so

Try to understand your child's point of view and avoid lecturing to keep the conversation
